Chairman'sForeword

This past year has been one of profound transformation. As we moved forward in our mission to ensure that every child with cancer in India not only survives—but thrives—we found ourselves returning to a powerful truth: each child is unique, and their care must be, too.

In 2023–24, CanKids not only expanded its footprint across India, reaching more children, more families, and more hospitals, but also began the inward journey of strengthening itself. We launched a two-year roadmap to consolidate, to realign, and to build systems and structures that will help us deliver quality care at scale. With every step, our focus sharpened on patient-centered care, not just as a slogan, but as a daily practice.

We supported over 20,000 children and families. We grew to 149 CHSUs and 22 Care Centres. We signed MoUs with 8 states and introduced the Canshala model in Tamil Nadu. We empowered parents, survivors, and caregivers to become advocates and navigators of the system. We deepened our partnerships—with government, hospitals, funders, and peers—and we honored our roots by always staying close to the lived experiences of the children we serve.

But growth brings growing pains. As we transition from a board-led to a management-driven model, and as we build stronger regional and state-level structures, we are learning how to pause and reflect—even as we scale. Some days, it feels like it would be easier to say: "Let's wait till everything is perfect." But that would be a mistake. Because to delay is to deny care, and the children waiting for us cannot wait.

So we move forward—with conviction, with humility, and with deep gratitude.

To our partners, supporters, team members, and families: thank you for your patience, your trust, and your belief in us. You have stood by us through transition and turbulence. You've reminded us that the future we are shaping is worth every effort.


And to every child with cancer—you are the reason we do this work. You are our light, our purpose, and our promise.

HIGHLIGHTS OF FY 2023-2024

Access, Reach & Impact

- 36,015 children and families benefitted across India Access
- CanKids reached 24,329 children across India Reach
- 89% growth in **Direct Beneficiary Support** over five years, reaching **20,467** children in FY 2023-24.

Partnerships for Change:

- 16 active Change for Childhood Cancer state projects.
- 8 State Government MoUs: New agreement with Uttar Pradesh (May 2023); renewals in Gujarat, Punjab and West Bengal.

Education & Care Expansion:

- Canshala education model extended to Tamil Nadu, the second state after Maharashtra.
- 22 Care Centres now operational nationwide, including 2 new centres (Home Away from Home & Canshala).

Survivorship:

• Passport2Life (P2L) clinics expanded from hospital-based programs to a State Model, with 15 P2L clinics including 5 state-level clinics in FY 2023–24.

Organizational Strength:

- Reinforced Pediatric Cancer Research Institute (PCRI), Medical, HR, and Regional Management teams.
- A year of C-Suite restructuring and key talent onboarding to drive the next decade of impact.





OUTCOMES FOR FY 2023-2024

ACCESS2CARE

1. Total Access: 36,015 children & families benefitted under state projects, reflecting a 13% increase in access since last year. This represents 47% of the total India incidence of 76,805 (against the target of 100% by 2030).

2. Total Reach:

- 149 CanKids Hospital Support Units (CHSUs) across India, covering 57 cities in 27 states.
- 8 new hospital partnerships were successfully established in the year.
- CanKids' total reach is 24,329 as of 31st March 2024, which is 31% of the total India incidence of 76,805.

3. Care Centers Operationalization:

- Successfully operationalized 2 new Care Centers in 2023-24:
 - One standalone Home Away from Home (HAH) in Nagpur.
 - One Canshala in Chennai.
 - As of March 2024, there are **18 HAHs** with a total capacity to support 256 families.

4. Awareness Initiatives:

• Two KCK Awareness Rallies were organized, one each in Madhya Pradesh and Gujarat.

5. State Projects & MoUs:

- 16 Change for Childhood Cancer (CCC) state projects are operational.
- MoUs signed with State Governments:
 - New: Uttar Pradesh
 - Renewed: West Bengal, Gujarat, and Punjab

- Maharashtra MoU renewal is currently underway.








DISEASE-SPECIFIC PROJECTS ONE CANCER AT A TIME (OCAT)

We collaborate with pediatric oncologists and researchers to improve survival outcomes through its One Cancer At A Time (OCAT) initiative. These focused projects address specific childhood cancers with targeted interventions and support.

As of March 2023, five OCATs were active. In FY 2023–24, three more were added, bringing the total to eight:

- Retinoblastoma
- Hodgkin's Lymphoma
- BSTS
- APML









EDUCATION PROGRAM

ADVOCACY & AWARENESS:

Letting Children Speak for Themselves

- 1,112 letters written by children to the Prime Minister, Union Health Minister, and MPs as part of the iDeservecampaign
- **1,200 children** participated in ICCD 2024 under the theme Bhavishya Banao Shaping Their Future

Cycle for Gold, Tata Mumbai Marathon, and I Pledge Odyssey activated public support and raised over ₹14 lakh collectively

RESEARCH & DEVELOPMENT

- Since 2013, CanKids has conducted 51 studies, with 18 research projects active during 2023–24.
- New collaborations were established with St. Jude Global, INPHOG, APAR Health, Pfizer, and others.
- The focus areas included survivorship, late effects, psychosocial support, systems strengthening, and improving access to care.

CAPACITY & SKILL BUILDING

- We conducted 112 capacity-building events this year, training a total of 10,407
 participants including healthcare providers, social support team members, ASHAs,
 and NGO partners.
- Signature training programs included the PAN India Nurses Workshop, the 7th Pediatric Hemato-Oncology Social Support Conference (PHOSSCON), and PACER (Pediatric Advocacy for Care and Education Roundtable).
- Community awareness efforts reached grassroots levels through sessions at PHCs and CHCs across all 13 states where we have MoUs.

HUMAN RESOURCES:

Building People Power

- Total Workforce: Grew by 19% to 485 staff.
- Social Support Team (SST) & Nurses (Medical & Paramedical): 358 staff about 74% of the total workforce- with strong growth in psychosocial counsellors, teachers, patient navigators nurses and other healthcare personnel.
- Managerial & Administrative Staff: 127 staff around 26% of the total team.

NOTEWORTHY CAMPAIGNS & EVENTS

- Nurses Workshop (February 2024): Trained 192 nurses in pediatric oncology with St. Jude Global & ICCI.
- APML Workshop (June): Built capacity of 90 program personnel and caregivers.
- Sarcoma Awareness Month (July): Engaged 200+ stakeholders via a focused webinar on sarcoma care.
- BSTS Survivor Workshop (July): Survivors shared personal journeys to inspire and educate others.
- Golden Walk (September): Held across 15 hospitals with 893 participants, advocating for timely diagnosis and care access.
- Winter Drive (December): Distributed warm clothing, spread awareness on seasonal illness prevention, and educated families in hospital clusters.

Pediatric Hematology Oncology Support Services Conference (PHOSSCON) 2023 - National Stakeholder Convergence

- 7th National PHOSSCON brought together over 200 stakeholders from across India.
- Focused on:
- 1. Challenges faced by families and survivors
- 2. Strengthening advocacy and policy dialogue
- 3. Collaboration through the India Childhood Cancer Initiative (ICCI)



International Childhood Cancer Day - World Cancer Day (ICCD-WCD) 2024:

A Movement of Awareness & Action

From February 4th (World Cancer Day) to April 15th, CanKids led a nationwide ICCD-WCD campaign:

- Hosted Cycle for Gold, Go Gold Gala and city/regional events to raise awareness and resources.
- Launched drawing competitions, quiz events, advocacy webinars, and **stakeholder dialogues** across all 4 zones – North, East, West, and South.
- Targeted to raise ₹2 Crore, reinforcing childhood cancer as a health and social priority.
- Unified messaging under "Bhavishya Banao Shaping Their Future" brought together survivors, caregivers, donors, doctors, and policy champions.










TREASURER'S NOTE





The financial year 2023–24 was marked by a year of strategic consolidation and prudent financial management. As CanKids continued its mission to deliver holistic, patient-centered care to children with cancer across India, the finance team remained focused on its commitment to ensure that every rupee deployed contributed to measurable and impactful outcomes.

Key Highlights:

- We increased our spending on state-level implementation through our CanKids Hospital Support Units (CHSUs), CanKids Care Center (CCC) Projects, and Care Coordination Center Offices, reinforcing our strategy for decentralization and local capacity building.
- We maintained a prudent balance of restricted and unrestricted funds, allowing for stability and flexibility to emerging needs.
- We strengthened core financial systems, controls, and processes—including timely completion of audits, compliance and donor utilization reporting.

The Financials:

CanKids recorded a total income for the year of **Rs. 4,001** (FY 22-23: Rs. 3,383) lakhs an increase of 18%. Total expenditure for the year was **Rs. 4,221** (FY 22-23: Rs 3,498) lakhs an increase of 20% over the previous year. Of the total expenditure **Rs. 3,652** lakhs, or 86 % was spent directly on programs and services for patients and families, with a continued focus on maximizing cost-effectiveness. The operations in the year resulted in a deficit of **Rs. 220** (FY 22-23: Rs 115) lakhs. The organisation is actively working towards mitigating the cumulative deficit in the FY 24-25 and beyond by enhanced fund-raising efforts.

Year-end cash and bank balances amounted to **Rs. 872** (FY 22-23: Rs. 639) lakhs that were higher than the previous year end. This was a result of higher grants & donations and other receipts of **Rs. 4,179** (FY 22-23 Rs. 3,742) lakhs an increase of 12%. The receipts also included a significant addition to the corpus of **Rs. 175** (FY 22-23: 21) lakhs. The payments including program expenses grew by 13% to **Rs. 3,895** (FY 22-23: Rs. 3,447) lakhs.

Gratitude and Forward Outlook:

We are especially grateful to our partners, donors, and stakeholders for their continued support & trust. Their steadfast commitment during our two-year organizational strengthening roadmap has enabled us to grow without compromising accountability or agility.

As we look ahead to 2024–25 and beyond, our commitment is clear: to steward resources responsibly, navigate the challenges of program and operations funding, strengthen systems at every level. Every child reached is a step closer to our 2030 goals of improved survival and holistic support for every child with cancer in India.



Independent Auditor's Report

To the Members of Cankids...Kidscan

Qualified Opinion

- 1. We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Cankids...Kidscan ('the Society'), which comprise the Balance Sheet as at 31 March 2024, the Income and Expenditure Account, and Receipts and Payments Account for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of the significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.
- 2. In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion section of our report, the aforesaid financial statements give a true and fair view in conformity with the Accounting Standards issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India ('ICAI') and other accounting principles generally accepted in India to the extent considered relevant by management of the Society as at 31 March 2024, including the financial position of the Society as at 31 March 2024, its financial performance and its receipts and payments for the year ended on that date.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

- 3. As stated in Note 18(iv) to the accompanying financial statements, during the current year, the Society has ascertained the liability for gratuity as at 31 March 2024 as per the actuarial valuation obtained by the Society. However, the Society has recorded the gratuity expenses on actual payment basis and not as per the aforesaid actuarial valuation, which is not in accordance with the accounting principles generally accepted in India under accrual basis of accounting as adopted by the Society. Had the Society recorded such liability under accrual basis of accounting, the employee benefit expense for the year ended 31 March 2024 and gratuity liability as at that date would have been higher by ₹119.76 lakhs

Schedule 17: Significant accounting policies

I) Background

Cankids...Kidscan is a Society registered under the Societies Registration Act, XXI of 1860 on 13 June 2012, bearing registration number 0736, having its registered office at D-7/7, Vasant Vihar, New Delhi-110057. The object of the Society is primarily to work with children with cancer, families of children with cancer and children of parents with cancer.

The Society has also renewed the registration under the Foreign Contribution (Regulation) Act, 2010/ Foreign Contribution (Regulation) Rules, 2011, for carrying out educational and social activities with registration number 231661613 dated 08 January 2021 for the period from 24 September 2020 to 24 September 2025.

The Society has been granted an exemption under section 12A of the Income-tax Act, 1961, vide Document Identification Number AABAC3450GE2021401 dated 28 May 2021and valid till AY 2026-27. The Society has also obtained exemption u/s 80G(5)(vi) of the Income-tax Act, 1961, which has Document Identification Number AABAC3450GF2021401 and valid till AY 2026-27.

II) Significant accounting policies

a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared and presented under the historical cost convention on the accrual basis (except for Gratuity) and in accordance with the generally accepted accounting principles and the applicable Accounting Standards issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India to the extent considered relevant by management of the Society. The accounting policies have been consistently applied by the Society and are consistent with those used in the previous year.

b) Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires the Society to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and the disclosures of liabilities at the date of financial statements and the reported amount of revenues and expenses during the period reported. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Any revision to accounting estimates is recognized prospectively in current and future periods.

c) The financial statements are prepared in Indian Rupees, which is also the Society's functional and presentation currency. All amounts have been rounded to the nearest lakhs up to two decimal places, unless otherwise stated. Consequent to rounding off, the number ₹ presented throughout the document may not add up precisely to the totals and percentages may not precisely reflect the absolute amounts.

d) Income recognition

(i) Grants and donations

Grants and donations are recognized to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Society, and these can be reliably measured.

Income from Grants and donation are recognized as income on accrual basis to the match the revenue and capital expenditure incurred during the year.

(ii) Interest income

Interest income is recognized using time proportion method, based on the rate implicit in the transaction.

e) Property, plant and equipment and depreciation

Tangible assets

Tangible assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Cost comprises the purchase price and any attributable cost of bringing the asset to its working condition for its intended use. Tangible assets received as donation in kind from individuals are shown at nominal value at ₹1/-in the books of account and tangible assets received as donation in kind from other institutions/ societies/ trust, if any, are recognized at value certified by registered/ independent valuer.

Depreciation

Depreciation on tangible assets is provided as per the rates and in the manner prescribed under Income -tax Act, 1961.

f) Funds

(i) Restricted funds

Corpus fund

Corpus fund represents amounts received from the donors for corpus and the same is deposited with bank and fixed deposits. The interest earned is utilised for general purposes of the Society.

Life membership fund

Life Membership fund represents life membership fees paid by members of the Society. The amounts are deposited in the bank as "fixed deposits".

Earmarked funds

Earmarked fund represents funds received for specified purposes. The amounts are deposited in the bank as 'fixed deposits' and interest received is utilized for the same purpose only.

Capital grant funds

Capital grant fund represents property, plant and equipment received from ICS (Indian Cancer Society) on their incorporation and other donors. The Society receives property, plant and equipment as donation in kind and the same is recorded at the nominal value of ₹1 each.

Project specific funds

"Project Specific fund" represents grants received from various funding agencies to carry out specific activities. These are held in Society until used for the purpose specified and deposits / investments are earmarked against them. Revenue from the restricted fund is recognized during the year in the Income and Expenditure Account to match the incurred revenue and capital expenditure. At the end of the agreement, the unutilized project fund is either returned to the respective donor or the same is transferred to Income and Expenditure Account in the relevant year in which the project is completed.

(ii) Unrestricted fund

General fund

The Society also receives "general funds" which are not subject to grantor stipulations as to use, and the same may be used as per the management's discretion. The surplus earned during the year, being general purpose in nature is carried forward for use in future periods. In case of deficit, if in any year, the same is adjusted against General fund.

g) Foreign currency transactions

Transactions in foreign currency and non-monetary assets are accounted for at the exchange rate prevailing on the date of the transaction. All monetary items denominated in foreign currency are converted at the year-end exchange rate.

The exchange differences arising on such conversion and on settlement of the transactions are dealt with in the Income and Expenditure Account.

h) Employee benefits

Provident fund

The Society makes contribution to statutory provident fund in accordance with Employees Provident Fund and Miscellaneous Provisions Act, 1952. This is a post-employment defined contribution plan and the contribution paid or payable is recognized as an expense in the period in which services are rendered by the employee.

Gratuity

Gratuity is a post-employment benefit and is in the nature of a defined benefit plan. Gratuity is calculated in the manner prescribed under Income Tax Act, 1961 and is recognized as expense on actual payment basis.

Other short-term benefits

Other short-term benefits are recognized as expenses on actual payment basis for the period during which services are rendered by the employee.

i) Impairment of assets

The Society on an annual basis makes an assessment of any indicator that may lead to impairment of assets. If any such indication exists, the Society estimates the recoverable amount of the assets. If such recoverable amount is less than the carrying amount, then the carrying amount is reduced to its recoverable amount by treating the difference between them as impairment loss and is charged to the Income and Expenditure Account. If at the balance sheet date there is an indication that if a previously assessed impairment loss no longer exists, the recoverable amount is reassessed and the asset is reflected at the recoverable amount subject to a maximum of depreciated historical cost.

j) Provisions and contingent liabilities

The Society makes a provision when there is a present obligation as a result of a past event where the outflow of economic resources is probable and a reliable estimate of the amount of the obligation can be made.

A disclosure is made for a liability when there is a:

- a) possible obligation, the existence of which will be confirmed by the occurrence/ nonoccurrence of one or more uncertain events, not fully with-in the control of the Society; or
- b) present obligation, where it is not probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation; or
- c) present obligation, where a reliable estimate cannot be made.

Where there is a present obligation in respect of which the likelihood of outflow of resources is remote, no provision or disclosure is made.

Schedule 18: Notes to the financial statements

(i) Allocation of common expenses

- a. Central core services expenses comprise of core staff and administrative expenses of all the core service programs including medical program, treatment support program, pediatric palliative care program, pediatric psycho-oncology program, education program, patient navigation and family engagement program, medical and social support informatics program, national outreach program, communication education patient awareness and advocacy, capacity and skill building, quality care and research impact program and salaries and allowances of the staff. The allocation of central core services expenses to all the Cankids hospital support units ('CHSU') is a fixed percentage of the net cost of the CHSU or Care Center as determined by the management. No allocation of such expenses is done where funding for a specific program is secured from a donor.
- b. Central administrative expenses allocation is a fixed percentage of each CHSU or care center budget as determined by the management. Central administrative expenses include Administrative, HR, Finance, Resource mobilization Planning & Governance expenditure. No allocation of such expenses is done where funding is secured from a donor.
- (ii) During the year, the Society has received donations amounting to ₹44.26 (Previous year: ₹28.40) as anonymous donation. However, the aggregate amount is within the permissible limit under Income Tax Act, 1961 (i.e. less than 5% of the total donation received during the year), hence it is not treated as taxable donation.
- (iii) During the year, the opening balance for expenses incurred in the local books of accounts to support ongoing foreign contribution projects and program activities was ₹33.34. Since August 2023, the Society has neither recorded expenditure related to the foreign funded projects in the local books nor made any payments from local funds to implement the foreign projects. This amount was transferred to the local bank account during the current year, resulting in a closing balance of Rs. Nil.
- (iv) Gratuity is a post-employment benefit and is in the nature of a defined benefit plan. The Society records the expenses incurred for the payment of gratuity in the manner prescribed under Income Tax Act, 1961 and recognized the expense on actual payment basis. As per actuarial valuation based on the projected unit credit method, the Society has ascertained the liability for gratuity as at 31 March 2024 as ₹119.76 lakhs. However, the Society has not recorded such liability in the financial statements under the historical cost convention on the accrual basis of accounting. The management is planning to consider recording this under accrual basis of accounting going forward.
- (v) During the year, interest earned on earmarked funds has been allocated on the respective earmarked funds on actual basis to utilize the same for directed purposes.
- (vi) The Society follows project accounting in case of specific projects, resultant unutilized amount of specific project funds has been shown as a 'Project specific fund' in the Balance Sheet. Similarly, in case if the Society spent excess amount against the amount received for specific projects, such amount has been shown as 'Grant receivable' up to the amount spent/utilized on the same projects.
- (vii) The annual financial statements of the Society are the consolidation of all the charitable activities run by the Society across the country.




